

Deputy back home after stabbing, prayer vigil held in Malta

by The Phillips County Sheriff's Office

On the 27th of July at approx 3:09 a.m., Phillips County Dispatch received a call from a motorist stating he saw

Dispatch received a can rhom a motorist stating he saw a young man walking down the middle of the highway wearing only underwear. When the man refused a ride, the motorist gave him a sweatshirt and continued on his way. The motorist called 911 as soon as service was available. Deputy Alan Guderjahn was dispatched to the area but initially could not find him. Guderjahn traveled several miles south and then north again. After stopping at a vehicle he identified as that belonging to Ambrose Mecklenburg, Guderjahn continued north on Highway that belonging to Ambrose Mecklenburg, Guderjahn continued north on Highway 191 until he saw a male walking down the highway which he recognized as Mecklenburg.

Deputy Guderjahn stopped and spoke with Mecklenburg offering him a ride to town, but the offer was refused. While speaking with Mecklenburg, Mecklenburg pulled a knife pulled a knife and attacked and attacked Guderjahn w i t h o u t warning. Deputy G u d e r j a h n tried to subdue

tried to subdue Mecklenburg physically and by using a taser which was ineffective. Deputy Guderjahn was forced to deploy

forced to deploy lethal force by discharging his firearm by discharging his firearm which resulted in the death of

Mecklenburg. After receiving several cuts and stabs to his head, arm,

The scene was secured by Sheriff Moran and Deputies. Due to this being an officer involved shooting the State of Montana

Department of Justice Division of Criminal Investigation was immediately contacted b١

Phillips County Sheriff Scott Moran. Agents later arrived on scene and took control of the investigation. Mccklenburg was transported to Billings for an autopsy by the Fergus County Coroner who will also conduct the Coroner's Inquest into the death.

conduct the Coroner's Inquest into the death. Deputy Guderjahn was transported to the Phillips County Emergency Room then flown to Great Falls for treatment of his wounds. Guderjahn was released on Thursday the 28th of July and returned home. The Division of Criminal Investigation and the Fergus County Coroner's Office continue to investigate the incident. Evidence has been collected and interviews are being conducted.

Nearly 60 people showed up to Malta's Front Street Park on Wednesday evening following an incident earlier that day which left Phillips County Sheriff Deputy Alan Guderjahn in the hospital and in which 20-year-old Ambrose E. Mecklenburg lost his life

Inspire and in which 20-year-out Annoise E. Mcckeholing lost his life. Candles were lit for the victims and a prayer circle was formed before Malta resident Kelly McCann started the ceremony. "Thank you for coming out in the rain tonight to honor our injured and our lost," McCann said. "Today we meet to send out prayers and positive thoughts to Deputy Guderjahn who now lays injured in a hospital in Great Falls and to thank him for the physical sacrifice he's made in selflessly defending us." McCann said he hoped that Deputy Guderjahn and his family are able to move forward from the incident and able to heal and find peace in the days to come. "It is also important for us to understand that to the creator, all life is precious," McCann continued. "We need to remember that all of us, even our Lord Jesus Christ, had a mother and today a life was taken and a life was lost and our prayers go out to the young man who died."

"Heavenly Father, we want to come before you today and our prayers ascend to you, oh Lord, we are reminded of the family who lost a loved one and we pray for them that you will comfort them and are near to them. We pray for our brother who has fallen and just ask that you, oh Lord, continue to give the doctor's wisdom as they deal with his injuries. Lord we pray that Alan would heal from the inside out and also heal from the stress that comes from an injury that has happened like this." comes from an injury that has happened like this



Phillips County Sheriff Scott Moran has contacted the Missoula Police Department and Walmart for transaction information and videos. Moran told the PCN on Thursday that local banks are supplying the Sheriff's Office information which he is forwarding with the Walmart records to the FBI as he receives and that the FBI is assisting in the investigation. 

We haven't had any critters in the outhouse that we know of, but the privy at the boat ramp less than a mile away has a sign on the door cautioning users to check for rattlesnakes before stepping inside. I always expect something to bite me when I'm in an outhouse anyway so laways look in all the corners before sitting down. If there's a snake inside, I'll head for the house. 



<u>Counseling Corner...</u> Why Parent-Teen **Communications Often Fall Short From the American Counseling Association** *Team Up For Success In Creating A Healthier Life*

As a parent you want to be there for your teenager. You try to learn what's happening in his or her life and try to help with problems or uncertainties he or she may be facing. But despite your best efforts, most of the time you are rebuffed. Responses ranging from stony silence to outright hostility leave you wondering how you have failed so miserably in connecting with your own child.

The e problem, however, may not be your fault but just the e fact that parent-teen communications are inherently simple plicated

One reason is simply that it's not easy to be a teenager. There's a variety of unsettling biological, psychological and emotional changes that are all part of a teen's normal developmental process. Pile on top of that the pressures of school, extracurricular activities, maybe a part-time job, and then the anxiety of college or a career in the near future, and it becomes easier to understand why the open communication you enjoyed with your pre-teen

or a career in the near future, and it becomes easier to understand why the open communication you enjoyed with your pre-teen has become much more challenging. Teenagers may often feel that their parents just can't understand all the changes and pressures they are facing. These feelings may be reinforced when parents react negatively to teens seeking to separate more from their parents and be more independent. While we all want our children to grow up and be responsible dults, it can be confusing to deal with as our teens take their first entative steps in that direction. This same process is also hard on the teen's side. He or she is anxious about sharing feelings of insecurity or uncertainty, about admitting mistakes, since it will but make him or her look weak, immature and not ready for the freedoms so badly desired. There is no quick fix for any of these communication issues, but it's important not to give up on the effort. While many of your communication attempts will likely seem inadequate, every now and then you will break through and have a meaningful discussion. As importantly, your attempts to stay connected are active demonstrations of your love and concern. Look for opportunities to let your teens know you're trying to understand and sympathize with all they are facing. Offer pointive feedback when it's deserved and let them know your tust and respect is being earned. It takes work to open up communication, but it is worth the effort.



Malta City Council meeting recap

pierepcnews @gmail.com The Malta City Council hosted two public hearings last Tuesday, July 26, with only a handful in attendance. The council approved changes to the City's Water Project, approved the Malta Skatepark's Safety Rules and closed on two loans associated with the Water Project. The council's first Public Hearing, Malta Mayor Shyla Jones read the council and attendees the First Reading of Ordinance #447, which is an

Ordinance #447, which is an amendment to ordinance #397

amendment to ordinance #397 repealing section 13.04.075 or vacation rates. The changes to #397 means that during times lot owners don't use or stop using water for months at a time will not be able to utilize the reduced water rate of \$5 a month, with a \$75 fee to turn the water back on because the vacation rates will not exist under the new will not exist under the new water rates.

'We determined with doing our new rates we weren't going to do vacation rates anymore," Mayor Jones said. "So we have to repeal this ordinance.

to repeal this ordinance." The meeting continued after no regular public comments were voiced. Michele Turville of Bear Paw Development announced that Water Project Loan was closed with the

reception of two deposits both worth \$76,443.00 from the Department of Natural

sources. 'I received the confirmation from Dorsey and Whitney saying that the city confirmed the receipt of funds from the DNRC," Turville said. "We are officially closed."

officially closed." Mayor Jones confirmed that payments toward the loan for the Water Project will start in January. The new water rates will affect users starting July 21, 2016

will affect users starting July 21, 2016. "The girls are working diligently to make sure that everything gets changes in the computer system," Mayor Jones said. The Council motioned to

The Council motioned to accept the first TCEP grant payout of \$284,306.63. The payout of \$284,306.63. The grant paid for 60-percent of the construction on roughly three blocks to Helena Sand and Gravel for their work on the City's Water Project. The motion to accept the TCEP grant check was made by Councilperson Bonnie Wiederrick and seconded by Councilman James Sintler. The council unanimously agreed. Mayor Jones announced a

Mayor Jones announced a needed \$28,930.80 change to the Water Project. The change order will come out of the contingency money already in the contract with Helena Sand nd Gravel

Though the city planned on

the contractor finding many hidden sewer service lines, they had no idea how many lines would be hidden due to the fact the lines weren't reported during installation many years ago. The new work order to change those lines order to change those lines will be paid for by the City's contingency fund.

contingency fund. "There was no way to really contract it, so of course they are finding some," Mayor Jones said. "We knew they were going to but there was no way to write it into the original contract. We have a contingency out there so this will come out of the contingency money." cont

ntingency money." By the time of the meeting, By the time of the meeting, Helena Sand and Gravel estimated to find 30 sewer service lines but more might be found throughout the remainder of the contract. A unanimous decision was made to accept the changes to the work order after a motion was made by Councilman David Rummel and seconded by Councilman James Sintler. The second public hearing was a needs assessment hearing

was a needs assessment hearing for a possible Community Development Block Grant. The maximum amount that the City could apply for would be \$450,000.

"That program is geared toward helping people with low to moderate income (LMI)," Turville said. She added that

in the 2010 Census, the City of Malta was at 62-percent LMI making the City eligible for the grant. Turville fielded suggestions

from the public as to what Malta and Phillips County needs. Any suggestions needs. Any suggestions made were written down for consideration.

"We are going to give it to the City Council and Phillips the City Council and Phillips County Commissioners because this is going to help them in their planning with their budgets," Turville said. "It is federal money. It is administered by the Department of Commerce." The categories of CDBG includes fixes, changes or additions to any public facility, economic development (job creation and retention) and housing programs.

creation and retention) and housing programs. Close to 30 suggestions were made which included a possible Senior Center, Community Center, a bigger work facility for Malta Opportunities Inc., A facility for The Phillips Transit Authority, better weed control, a school bus barn for Malta Public Schools, a dog park and Weather Station / Webcam for more accurate weather for more accurate weather reporting for Malta.

Malta has already started the planning for a Phase II water project so they will be putting in an application to CDBG for that next water improvement

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Sage grouse hunting open again in Montana for month of September Wildlife Commission sage

Expanded opportunities for sage grouse hunting will be offered this year in Montana as bird populations have rebounded well after two years of favorable spring weather condition

of favorable spring weather conditions. Though the brief decline and subsequent bounce back of sage grouse numbers can likely be attributed to weather and normal cycles in bird populations, the population numbers and quick rebound are encouraging, said Catherine encouraging, said Catherine Wightman, wildlife habitat and Farm Bill coordinator for Montana Fish, Wildlife & Parks

Parks. "These kinds of population cycles are normal, what we're hoping to do with our habitat conservation efforts and monitoring work is to keep the dips in population from being so dramatic," Wightman said. Sage grouse season opens Sept. 1 and runs through the month, closing Sept. 30. The bag limit is two birds with a possession limit of four. Sage grouse populations

Sage grouse populations struggle with habitat struggle with habitat fragmentation, impacts from energy development and the conversion of sagebrush steppe habitat to cropland. However, decades of efforts at monitoring sage grouse and conserving their habitat in Montana has paid off. In 2015 U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service decided the bird didn't warrant listing on the Endangered Species List the Endangered Species List because of ongoing habitat conservation work in Montana

conservation work in Montana and throughout their range. Under the FWP Sage Grouse Conservation Plan, adopted in 2005, FWP will recommend to the Fish and



Wildlife Commission sage grouse hunting season closures when populations dip below 45 percent of their long term average. However, before 2014 the Commission had yet to use that rationale to close sage grouse hunting in the state. In fact, the plan outlined conditions for closing hunting, but didn't have provisions for

but didn't have provisions for when hunting would be re-opened. When the hunting opened. When the hunting season was closed in 2014, the Commission approved conditions for the season to be re-opened. One of the conditions being that sage grouse lek counts were higher in one year than the long-term average. That condition was met this spring, Wightman said. Leks are locations where sage grouse males conduct their mating rituals, which is comprised of strutting, fanning tail feathers and making tail feathers and making popping noises with their bulbous air sacs.

bulbous air sacs. Weather watching Weather conditions play an important role in sage grouse numbers from year to year, particularly during the time when sage grouse hens are incubating eggs in the nest and when the chicks are first hatched, she said. hatched, she said.

"After they hatch, they're so vulnerable," Wightman said. "They can walk, but they're downy little fuzz balls walking through the sagebrush. They can't fly and they don't have adult feathers to insulate them."

them." After several years of wet springs with flooding and hail, the juvenile recruitment was way down in 2013 and overall numbers dropped to some of the lowest since 1980. However, one good year

However, one good year f recruitment made all the difference. Weather was favorable for

Weather was favorable for sage grouse in the spring of 2014, so while the overall number of adults were down, the crop of new birds was really good. The males born in the spring of 2014 were displaying on the leks in 2015. This year lek counts in all three FWP sage grouse management areas were above the long-term trends by an average of 17 percent statewide. 17 percent statewide. Counting leks For trend data

For trend data and management decisions, biologists count displaying male sage grouse during the mating period on leks around the state. The birds return to the same leks year after year, and while there are hundreds around Montana, FWP biologists focus on 88 for their counts that influence management decisions, management Wightman said. decisions,

These 88 leks have long-term These 88 leks have long-term data strings with some going back to 1980 and provides a solid foundation for analyzing sage grouse numbers. "We use those as barometers for population trends," she said.

Hunting and management While some may be concerned that sage grouse hunting is re-opened, especially considering the effort FWP, the state and landowners have made and continue to make in ensuring populations numbers remain within naturally fluctuating ranges to keep the birds off the ESA, the fact is hunting has little impact on bird numbers. In the past 16 years, FWP biologists have collared about 1,300 adult birds in areas where hunting was allowed. So far only nine of those birds have been killed by hunters, said John Vore, FWP game management bureau chief. "That's a very low number," Hunting and manager While some ma nent

management bureau chief. "That's a very low number," he said. "The effects of hunting, at least in Montana, are very minimal." Additionally, though the Montana management plan allows for a more standard hunting season with a bag limit of four birds, the Fish and Wildlife Commission, with recommendations from FWP staff, decided on a conservative season structure with a two-bird bag limit and

conservative season structure with a two-bird bag limit and a season only open from Sept. 1 – Sept. 30. The conservative approach seemed prudent considering the sage grouse in Montana and the rest of the region will have another ESA review in 2020. Still, Montana's sage grouse

Still, Montana's sage grouse success story is one worth applauding. "We're the only state in the

"We're the only state in the West that's completely open for sage grouse and we have the longest hunting season," Wightman said. The continued focus from a management standpoint will be on habitat conservation and making strides toward maintaining stable long-term trends – to especially try and keep the numbers during the low, if possible. The fact is you can still have good years in

low, if possible. The fact is you can still have good years in terms of population, but have declining numbers over all. "Conservation of habitat is important so we can ensure the long-term trends of the populations are stable," she said. "We aren't trying to get back to the sage grouse populations of the 1960s, but we think we can maintain a steady population by maintaining good habitat and that's the goal."



A Call to Mental Health Awareness

The Local Advisory Council for Mental Health and Addictive Services sponsored a Mental Health Awareness Meeting last week at the Great Northern Lodge. Among things discussed were a need for action, a new court appointed 24-7 program, potential grants and other concerns brought up by local departments within the county. "The whole purpose of the Local Advisory Council is to improve or extend mental healthcare in the region we live," Council member Janice Reichelt said. "But we can't do it without knowing what areas

we can't do it without knowing what areas are really problem areas and what you want us to work on." Reichelt went on to say that is grant

money out there to help communities that need help in the realm of mental health problems 'They want to decrease the suicide rates

and get people stabilized and functioning to the best of their ability," Reichelt said. Reichelt opened the floor for improvement suggestions from the organizations and people present at the

Some of the suggestions from the organizations and people present at the meeting. Some of the suggestions included decreasing the wait time of persons and alcohol treatment, providing help to sufferers of mental and physical pain, improved crisis prevention, a suicide prevention program, improved children to adult transition program and there was an expressed need for a coordinator for the local ambulance service and a general concern about the welfare of the nursing home residents and staff. "I really would like a local mental health clinic. Kind of like a day treatment program. A place where people can go and get the help they need and people can connect them to services." services.

Janice Roberts, a member of the Local Advisory Council since its beginning ten years ago, brought attention to those suffering from mental issues due to physical pain. She shared a personal experience that involved her son, who has honorably served in Iraq and Afganistan. "Through his deployments, we've become very educated as to what happens to people who endure combat drama," Roberts said. "There have been many issues in his recovery. We learned about a pain relief clinic in Billings Mont." She shared an invaluable resource, the Yellowstone Naturopathic Clinic, who works with sufferers of chronic pain. The number to reach the clinic is 406-259-5096.

"It is a problem in our county and in other counties," Tollefson said. "Two dollars will go to the program and two dollars will stay at the P.C. Sheriff's Department," Stahl said. "It does not cost us any money to bring the program in."
The Council also discussed the possibility of A.C.E. or Adverse Childhood Experience training as a resource for Phillips County in the near future.
